# The Process of Research

The Australian Rotary Health Research Fund research program is

proceeding very well. In 2005, the ARHRF is supporting 20 research projects and seven PhD students in the area of mental illness. In addition nine, “funding partners” research projects and eight “funding partners” PhD students are being jointly supported by the ARHRF, Rotary Clubs and Universities.

The advertisement for research applications, PhD scholarships, and Post-Doctoral Fellowships for 2006 has appeared in the media and has been sent to all universities in Australia. Substantial work is required for a successful research application with researchers spending several weeks preparing their applications. These must all be submitted to the

ARHRF by Friday 5th August 2005. Following this, a subcommittee of the ARHRF Research Committee undertakes an initial review of applications. Those applications that pass successfully through this stage are sent to all member of the Research Committee. Each member provides a grading for each research project.

The full research committee meets for two days in October to review the gradings given to each grant before a final decision is made about which research projects will be supported. It is important to note that committee members are excluded from the meeting (and from the earlier gradings) when applications from staff in their own Department or applications upon which they are a researcher, are being considered. This ensures gradings are provided only by committee members who are free of a conflict of interest in relation to each grant.

A major current challenge is to develop approaches that ensure that Rotarians who provide the funding are aware of the findings and benefits of our research program. This is a challenge being faced by many research-funding organisations. In the past, such organisations were satisfied if the results from research

projects were published in peer-reviewed journals and presented at appropriate scientific meetings. However, this is no longer the situation with funders wanting to know and understand the findings from the research they support. This is important to ensure ongoing fund raising is successful. The ARHRF is working to address this issue. In the past we have often arranged for our researchers to present their work to Rotary Clubs. However, there are only a small number of researchers and a large number of clubs! We are now exploring a range of other approaches, including the use of media experts to help translate technical research findings into language all Rotarians understand!

## *A Note from CEO Joy Gillett*

Two members of the Research Committee have recently taken up new appointments but both have agreed to continue their roles with the Committee. Michael Sawyer has been appointed Head, Department of Paediatrics in the Faculty of Health Sciences at the University of Adelaide. Tony Jorm has been appointed as a Professorial Fellow at the University of Melbourne.

## Our First Ian Scott Fellow Graduate – Dr Melanie Porter

Melanie Porter was awarded a Bachelor of Psychology with First Class Honours at Macquarie University in 1999. In 2004 Melanie completed her Masters Degree in Clinical Neuropsychology at Macquarie University and her PhD in Cognitive Neuropsychology within the Macquarie Centre for Cognitive Science (MACCS), Macquarie University, Sydney with the assistance of the ARHRF Ian Scott Fellowship. Melanie’s PhD investigated cognitive (thinking) and socio-motion abilities in Williams Syndrome, autism, Asperger’s syndrome and Down syndrome; the main focus of her research was Williams Syndrome - a genetic disorder with physical, cognitive and medical characteristics.

Melanie is currently working as a Clinical Neuropsychologist at the Children’s Hospital at Westmead and is a researcher at the hospital and within the Macquarie Centre for Cognitive Science (MACCS), Macquarie University, Sydney. Melanie has been a tutor and guest lecturer at Macquarie University.

Melanie is currently collecting blood samples in order to study the genetic basis of Williams Syndrome and the link between gene abnormalities and abnormalities in thinking and behaviour in Williams Syndrome and has received a 2005 research project grant, also through the ARHRF.

Among Melanie’s wide professional interests are neuropsychology, neuropsychiatry, cognitive neuropsychology, child development, genetics, and neurodevelopmental disorders.

*A/Prof Greg Snell  
The Alfred & Monash University  
Rotary Club of Williamstown,

A/Prof Greg Snell is currently the Medical Head of the Alfred's Lung Transplant Service and is one of the world's most senior and experienced clinician-scientists in human lung transplantation. He trained in Lung Transplantation at the University of Toronto on a Will Rogers Scholarship and was subsequently awarded a Fellowship in Respiratory Medicine at The University of Toronto. Dr Snell has worked at The Alfred Hospital in transplantation since then and currently The Alfred's service represents one of the largest and most prolific lung transplant programmes in the world.

"The project aims to look at the best way of preserving livers, kidneys, lungs (and potentially other organs like pancreas and heart) from a non-heart beating donor model.

We've been able to evolve a technique that is very satisfactory for the use of non-beating heart donor lungs. We are in the middle of our experiments on protecting the liver and kidney and things are going very well. Recently, using our evaluation circuit, we were able to show excellent function of a liver and a kidney that had been without a blood supply or any form of preservation for 35 and 50 minutes respectively. Our evaluation circuit was quite stable 4 hours on. This is probably the first time multiple organs have been supported by machine, and evaluated outside of the body, many hours after the heart has stopped in the donor. The next step will be to combine the procedures together in a coherent fashion with the aim to introduce them into local practice in the near future.

This most recent experiment was aided by the generous gift from Rotary friends of a Jostra centrifugal pump. It is essentially an artificial



heart lung machine with a Rotary pump (ironic?). It was very useful and successful and will remain the cornerstone of the coming complex

multiorgan experiments we have planned over the next few months. All thanks to Rotarians.

Our work has been presented at a number of local and international venues. We have recently been invited to discuss some of our early results in The Age, The Australian Transplant Society meeting, The Australian Thoracic Society Meeting, A Roche National Transplant Symposium and the International Society for Heart and Lung transplant Society Meeting in Philadelphia. At all opportunities we certainly acknowledge Williamstown Rotary Club and the Australian Rotary Health Research Fund as major sponsors of the work to date."

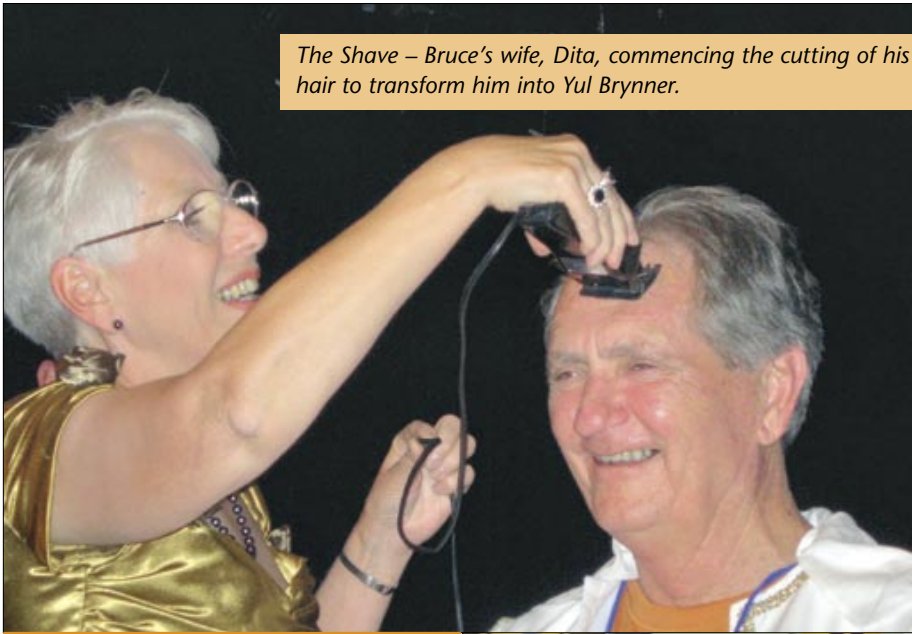

**Understanding how the immune system can be disarmed: a pathway to disease or wellbeing.**

"CD8 T cells are the armed sentry guards of our immune system; they constantly monitor our bodies for signs of viral infection or cancer. When they find such invaders they use their weapons to kill affected cells and stop the disease from spreading. In some situations CD8 T cells can turn against the body leading to autoimmune disease. We are investigating how the CD8 T cell chooses between two different

pathways, one leads to an armed CD8 T cell which is able to kill, the other leads to an impotent disarmed cell. Understanding how the cell chooses to follow a certain pathway may lead to new treatments where avoiding the disarming pathway may allow the body to effectively fight cancers or infections; alternatively, leading the CD8 T cell down the disarming pathway may provide a treatment for autoimmune disease."

## A Close Shave for Cancer Research

Last year District 9680 Governor, Bruce Allen and his wife, Dita, lost three members of their family to cancer.

To highlight the need for medical research into cancer DG Bruce, at the recent District 9680 conference, held at Darling Harbour in Sydney, issued a challenge to the District Chairman of the Australian Rotary Health Research Fund, Monica Saville, to raise \$30,000 for cancer research.

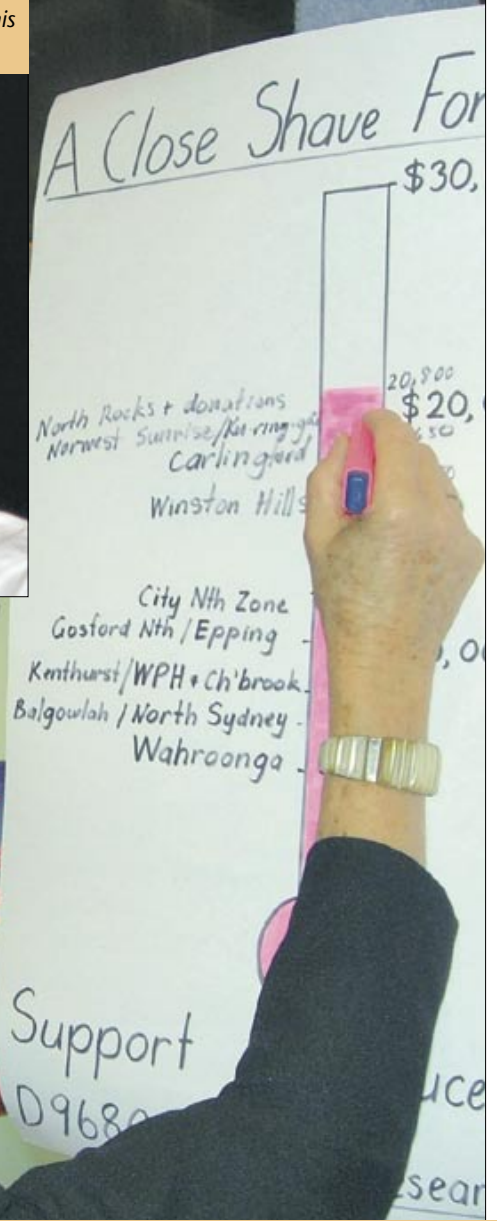
If this could be achieved at the conference DG Bruce would have his head shaved.

Our very efficient and hard working Monica readily accepted the challenge and by the Saturday evening and before the dinner, \$30,910 had been raised.

Through the ARHRF Funding Partners program’s “multiplier effect” this figure will become a \$75,000 three year PhD research scholarship.

At the Let’s Celebrate dinner on the Saturday evening DG Bruce had to accept the consequences of his offer.

Congratulations to Monica Saville and her District Rotary Health Committee for the wonderful effort and the District 9680 Rotarians in exceeding the target and to DG Bruce Allen for being such a good sport – all for the good of Rotary.
